Elementary and Secondary Sessions: Engaging Oregon History with the Oregon Historical Society

Learn about classroom-ready resources for teaching engaging Oregon history! The Oregon Historical Society (OHS) provides a wealth of resources for K–12 educators, including tours, standards-aligned Oregon history curricula, traveling trunks with hands-on objects and accompanying lesson plans, digital resources, and the Oregon History Day program and contest. All of OHS's resources use primary and secondary source documents to support inquiry and analysis skills and are aligned with the 2024 Oregon Social Science Standards.

OHS will be presenting an elementary session for K–5 educators and a secondary session for 6–12 educators to introduce OHS's resources and highlight grade-level specific resources. You will leave with something to use in your classroom the next day!

Elementary Session: Oregon History Primary Sources for Elementary Students (K-5)

Use primary sources to teach an inclusive Oregon history and enhance students' observational and critical-inquiry skills! The Oregon Historical Society (OHS) offers a variety of classroom-ready primary sources, featuring historical images, objects, and documents, for elementary classrooms that highlight the experiences of the diverse groups that have called Oregon home since time immemorial to today.

This workshop will introduce you to resources and classroom strategies to help you integrate primary sources into your classroom. You will leave with something to use in your classroom the next day!

Secondary Session: Resources for Teaching Ethnic Studies (6–12)

Join the Oregon Historical Society (OHS) to learn about OHS's expanding K–12 ethnic studies curricula offerings to teach a more inclusive history of Oregon in your classroom.

Written for grades 6–12, DBQs teach Oregon history — with connections to broader themes in U.S. and world history — through the analysis of primary and secondary sources.
